- *Encourages people to consider their individual impact on the wider community including participation in political, economic, social, cultural, and environmental conditions in which they live.*

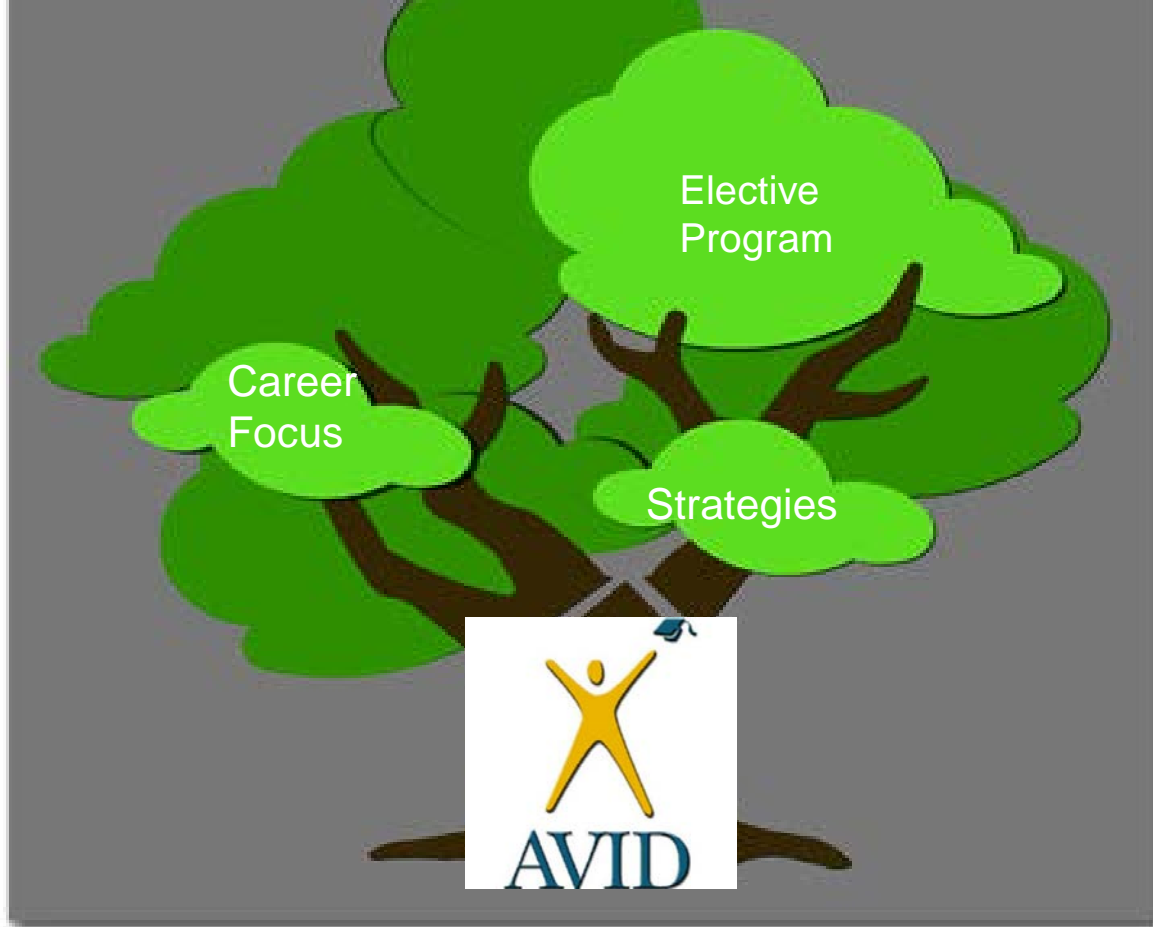
